Renting Humane Traps

PAWS rents out humane traps and provides instructions on trapping and feral cat colony maintenance. Ask our staff for full details.

Most major shelters rent humane traps to the public for feral cat trapping. Most require a deposit that is refunded when the trap is returned. Ask our staff for "trapping alert" posters to put up in your neighborhood prior to trapping. This warns neighbors who let their cats roam that they may be accidentally trapped, and encourages them to keep the cat indoors. Contact your local shelter or animal control agency for more information.
